ⁱ Allows up to \$10 million to be used for JABG activities described as “building, expanding, renovating, or operating temporary or permanent juvenile correction, detention, or community corrections facilities, which are authorized activities under the former JABG program.” Reflects language first inserted HR 3547, the FY14 Omnibus bill which zeroed out JABG funding.

ⁱⁱ Earmarks include: \$5m for tribal youth; \$2.5m for gang and youth violence prevention and education; \$2.5m for anti-youth drinking programs; \$10m for law enforcement and juvenile justice authorities to collaborate DOE’s School Climate Transformation Grantees on programs to increase school safety and reduce juvenile arrests.

ⁱⁱⁱ Earmarks include: \$5m for tribal youth; \$3m for gang and youth violence prevention and education; \$1m for anti-youth drinking programs; \$8m for law enforcement and juvenile justice authorities to collaborate with DOE’s School Climate Transformation Grantees on programs to increase school safety and reduce juvenile arrests.
